The RCABC Paddle Fest at Lake Kawkawa was a smashing success with over 100 people signed up. Lots of old friends and many families and children who are allowed to roam free including specialized children activities, storytelling, games and more.

There were also workshops galore: instructors' recertifications, big canoes, early morning and evening paddles, hiking, and many paddling clinics. Rick Bryans brought his fleet of open whitewater canoes plus his C-1s. There were clinics: C-1 clinics, rolling and polling clinics, recertifications, knot tying, northern trip slide show, stretch and strength classes, gear repair workshops, and more. And of course, the RCABC race regatta: tandems class, family class, open boat, and big canoe races.

The RCABC AGM was also held; uneventfully the usual suspects were largely re-elected. Keiran announced it is his last year as President, so hopefully some of you step up as we need to find more willing people. All and all the event was pretty successful unless you're a foodie: camp food is okay with sleeping on summer camp cots or tenting. Anyway, it works, especially because Kari Anne Thor's huge effort with of course, a large, huge number of people assisting who I dare not name as I will leave out too many.

The Beavers' Basic Paddlers course at Deer Lake is in full swing using the traditional Robson formulae rejigged by Dave Broughton's massive effort so that we have over 60 people taking it. TRIP REPORTS

Beaver Canoe Club Trip - Lower Chilliwack River.

On Sunday April 16th, the club paddled the lower Chilliwack River. Seven boats were put in at Osborne Road, with one tandem (Jenny, Rebecca), four solo canoes (Leigh, Dave, Scott, Jordi) and two kayaks (Scott, Owen).

It was a cool (<10°C) and overcast day. River levels were quite low; much lower than many had seen/paddled in years. We passed several substantial log jams on the river's flood plain, remnants of last year's catastrophic floods. The river was also unrecognizable in areas due to avulsion, which had rerouted the river channel during the previous floods. At one point near the

end of the trip, we had to portage around a large tree that rested across the entire river from bank to bank. Despite wet conditions having been forecast, we largely escaped poor weather, with only light intermittent showers throughout the day. Fortunately, the rain commenced at the end of the trip near the takeout at Lickman Rd.

April 23 Alouette River scheduled trip.

Not enough people participated to make it an official Beaver trip, so Rebecca (in a kayak), Marita and Peter (canoe) decided to do an unofficial one. We checked out the 224th St. put-in but the start looked a little gnarly to us, so we decided 216th St would be safer put in. We paddled and drifted down the Alouette River from there to the Trail Pavilion take-out. The weather was cloudy and rainless and gave a thoroughly fine paddle. We met kayakers coming upstream collecting garbage as well as other kayakers coming up from Trail Pavilion. We gave the nesting herons some entertainment as we were the only paddlers going downstream at the time.

April 30 Moody Inlet scheduled trip.

Another scheduled Beaver trip that turned unofficial. What better way to spend the last tax filing day than to be on a calm, windless, rainless, sunless ocean? Dave, Leigh, Rita and Peter paddled in two canoes from the loco Rd & First Ave. put-in to the Jug Island Beach, where we had lunch. We saw many seals and an eagle trying to catch a seagull for lunch – a rare sight. A few kayakers around the Deep Cove area of the ocean and the occasional crabber checking their traps. Otherwise, little traffic. The trip back is always interesting late in the day as you have some waves caused by the power boats returning from their weekend trip up Indian Arm.

REPEAT REMINDER: VOYAGEUR BRIGADES ADVENTURE

There are plans for two voyageur brigades this summer. Here is some intel gleaned from BCC member Katie S:

Fort Assiniboine Bicentennial Brigade - Athabasca River July 6 to 14, 2023: from Whitecourt AB to Athabasca AB. The trip will be 6 days on the river plus a layover day at Fort Assiniboine to take in the community's bicentennial events. This is a trip of some 340 kms. Given the 200th anniversary of Fort Assiniboine, a river that was once a very important fur trade route, and utilized by the likes of David Thompson, George Simpson, and Paul Kane, all paddlers interested in fur trade history should consider participating in this brigade next summer!

This route is moving water, Alberta eastern slope river. Very fun. One of the organizers tells me the vibe along the river is very positive, so it should be FUN!

The estimated cost is \$2000 per crew. We would want at least 6 paddlers, and up to 14, PLUS a driver for each vehicle taken up there. Some days will have the opportunity for crew change.

Trent Severn Waterway July 28 to Aug 7, 2023: from Georgian Bay through the 24 locks, lakes,



and canals to the site of the new Canadian Canoe Museum on

Peterborough's waterfront to celebrate opening it's a newly built site. Acknowledging the First Nations traditional territories it passes through, the Brigade has invited Chippewas Rama and Georgina Island. and the First Nations of Beau Soleil, Curve Lake. Hiawatha. Alder and Ville to participate.

We now have a great new tool for organizing impromptu paddles and last-minute communications on planned or impromptu trips. Want to get in on an impromptu trip with a group? Join the Seymour River chat group and use the WhatsApp app to help Seymour River paddlers!

The purpose of the group is to organize impromptu paddles and last-minute communication (e.g., change of meeting location/time) on planned or impromptu trips.

This chat group is not directly affiliated with any particular canoe or paddling clubs, so it acceptable to invite any friend to become a chat group member provided you know them fairlywell, they are competent, safety conscious and appropriately equipped for whitewater paddling.

You join by having the WhatsApp app. You may need to download it.

WhatsApp makes it easier for organizers to initiate impromptu trips. It also circumvents problems that occur with email when people keep adding more names to email threads (a few people ultimately get left out of some messaging). With WhatsApp every member sees every message. What could be better?

The chat group Administrators' only roles are to accept or remove people from the chat group and to help people to become members. They do not monitor message content nor accept responsibility for misuse of the chat group.

You can install WhatsApp on multiple devices. Members' have it on their cell phones, and some also have it installed on their Windows PCs (Windows requires WhatsApp to be installed on the phones first).

Kayaks and canoes are welcome.
